Robin McKnight Colon Cancer Survivor

At 39, in the prime of her life, Robin McKnight, wife and mom of three was diagnosed with Stage 3 Colon Cancer- Adenocarcinoma.

Robin McKnight is a mother, fiancé to her lifelong friend, family member, friend and photographer from Crockett Co. TN. At age 39, Robin started noticing some signs and symptoms that lead her to believe that something wasn't quite right with her body. She was light headed and dizzy often and just wasn't feeling great. Her routine bloodwork looked fine and she seemed healthy but she knew something just wasn't right. Robin had her firstcolonoscopy and they discovered that she had stage 3 Adenocarcinoma.

Robin was referred to see a surgeon first and was referred by her surgeon to Dr. Franz here at Kirkland Cancer Center. Robin says that each of her Drs. have been amazing here at Kirkland Cancer Center




but especially Dr. Franz. "I'll never forget.. I was distraught like anyone who hears the words you have cancer would be and Dr. Franz came in with his big smile and said 'we're going to cure you' he did not say if or when it was we are going to and right then and there I was like okay, let's do this, we are going to fight"

Robin had 28 rounds of radiation and 6 total chemo infusions. She has had one complete surgery and is getting ready to undergo her second. "I am feeling blessed to be here for sure. It's not been easy, I am not going to sit here and sugar coat it. There are days that I deal with fatigue and nausea but I just try to take it one day at a time. If that day I am feeling tired I just try to rest." Robin said. Robin was able to work and keep up with her twins through her cancer journey which is truly inspiring.

"To me it has been very convenient having Kirkland Cancer Center right here close to my hometown. It saved me from having to go to Memphis. I also love how well the Drs. collaborate and work with each other here" said Robin "The message I would give anyone my age or anyone in general is go get screened! It's not that hard, it's not as scary as it sounds and it can save your life. The goal is to catch this early to be treated and cured so I would definitely say don't hesitate. Go get screened!"



Some of the members purchase and package the physical

items needed such as peanut butter and crackers, hard candy etc., while others prepare handmade keychains and bookmarks explaining the plan of salvation. The church's mission with the Kirkland Cancer Center is to provide items to make patients more comfortable during their treatments and to provide encouragement from God's word to strengthen (IS. 41:10 and IS.40:31) them.



Tennessee Breast And Cervical Spotlight, Adora Butler

The Tennessee Breast and Cervical Screening Program (TBCSP) Grant was awarded to Jackson Madison Co. General Hospital by the CDC's National Breast and Cervical Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP). This grant is managed by Kirkland Cancer Center with a mission to prevent unnecessary disease, disability and premature death due to cancer of the breast and or cervix. In 2022, 393 patients were enrolled in the program. Out of those 393, 12 were diagnosed with either breast or cervical cancer and were able to obtain emergent Tenncare to get treatment started ASAP.

Adora Butler is the Tennessee Breast and Cervical Screening Coordinator for Madison County. Adora received her LPN in 2009 and began working at the Kirkland Cancer Center in September of 2020 after her sister was diagnosed with cancer. "This allowed me to see the positive side of working in oncology. When you or a loved one receives this type of news, your world shatters and you have no idea what to do next. I wanted to be the person that could help navigate these patients through these difficult times. I love helping people. I love being able to take some of the stress away so that they can solely focus on getting better."

In her time here at Kirkland Cancer Center Adora has gone above and beyond to ensure that her patients are well taken care of. Adora was recognized by the TBCSP Program Director for having the highest number of enrollments across the state of TN for 2022. Adora always takes her job a step further to ensure she is doing all that she possibly can for her patients. Adora completed a Health Navigation course to help patients find different resources available to them in our area. She also competed the WTH Bereavement course to better assist patients in their time of need after a diagnosis. "Adora seeks ways to improve the lives of others and honors her sister's memory each and every day. She embodies the definition of a servant leader and we are truly grateful she is a part of the Kirkland Cancer Center family."

Kirkland Cancer Center Earns National Re-Accreditation from the Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons

Kirkland Cancer Center proudly announces that it has earned re-accreditation from the Commission on Cancer (CoC), a quality program of the American College of Surgeons (ACS). To achieve CoC accreditation, Kirkland Cancer Center underwent a site visit to confirm the program's compliance with accreditation standards that evaluate the cancer care services offered by the program. The survey was delayed one year due to Covid restrictions. The survey was the first all virtual survey with the new standards revisions.

As a CoC-accredited cancer center, Kirkland Cancer Center applies a multidisciplinary approach and treats cancer as a complex group of diseases that requires consultation among surgeons, medical and radiation oncologists, diagnostic radiologists, pathologists, and other health care professionals that specialize in caring for the cancer patient. Cancer patients benefit from having access to clinical trials, screening and prevention events, palliative care, genetic counseling, rehabilitation, oncology nutrition, and survivorship services.

In January of 2022, Kirkland Cancer Center's hematology-oncology practice received re-certification by the American Society of Clinical Oncologists as a QOPI Certified Practice. The QOPI® Certification Program provides a three-year certification recognizing exemplary commitment to safety and quality in oncology patient care. Kirkland Cancer Center is one of only 5 oncology practices in the state of Tennessee with this certification. Certification requirements include clinical quality data comparison with other oncology practices across the nation plus a vigorous on-site clinical survey every 3 years.

Our practice achieved this certification by meeting QOPI's core standards in all areas of treatment, including:

- Treatment planning
- Staff training and education
- Chemotherapy orders and drug preparation
- Patient consent and education
- Safe chemotherapy administration
- Monitoring and assessment of patient well-being

West Tennessee Woodturners

The West Tennessee Woodturners, a local chapter of the American Association of Woodturners, began in Jackson, Tennessee in 2009 and has approximately 30-35 members ranging in ages from 15 to 80's. The group is made up of individuals who share the same love for woodturning, an art of shaping wood into various forms by means of a lathe, a process dating back to the 1300's BC.

The project of making wig stands for the Kirkland Cancer Center started in September of 2022 after the Mid-South Woodturners Guild(MSWG) in Memphis began a program of turning wig stands for the West Cancer Center in Memphis, Tennessee. A member from the MSWG presented a demonstration of turning wig stands at one of the monthly meetings of the West Tennessee Woodturners(WTW), and subsequently, the club started donating wig stands for the patients at Kirkland Cancer Center. To date, they have donated 50 stands.

"It is truly a blessing for our club to provide wig stands to cancer patients undergoing treatment that is causing hair loss and hopefully, making it easier to care for the wigs they're wearing, said Mark Bateman, President of the WTW.

We are so thankful for the West Tennessee Woodturners group and all that they are doing to help the patients here at Kirkland Cancer Center. "It's difficult when a lady loses her hair and gets a wig. These wig stands are bright and colorful and have inspirational wording on them which is so uplifting to a woman to see as she uses it daily on her cancer journey" said Kim Tucker, Support Services Manager.

Some other community service projects the WTW are involved with include, Pens for Troops, a national program of turning writing pens and sending to military troops stationed all over the world, and supporting LeBonheur Children's Hospital by donating turned items for sale at the Jackson International Food and Arts Festival.

Mark Bateman, the current President of the West Tennessee chapter, is a retired Ophthalmologist who used to refer patients to the physicians here at KCC. "It really is full circle to have referred patients here during my practice and now be able to help patients treated at this wonderful medical facility through a project such as this".
